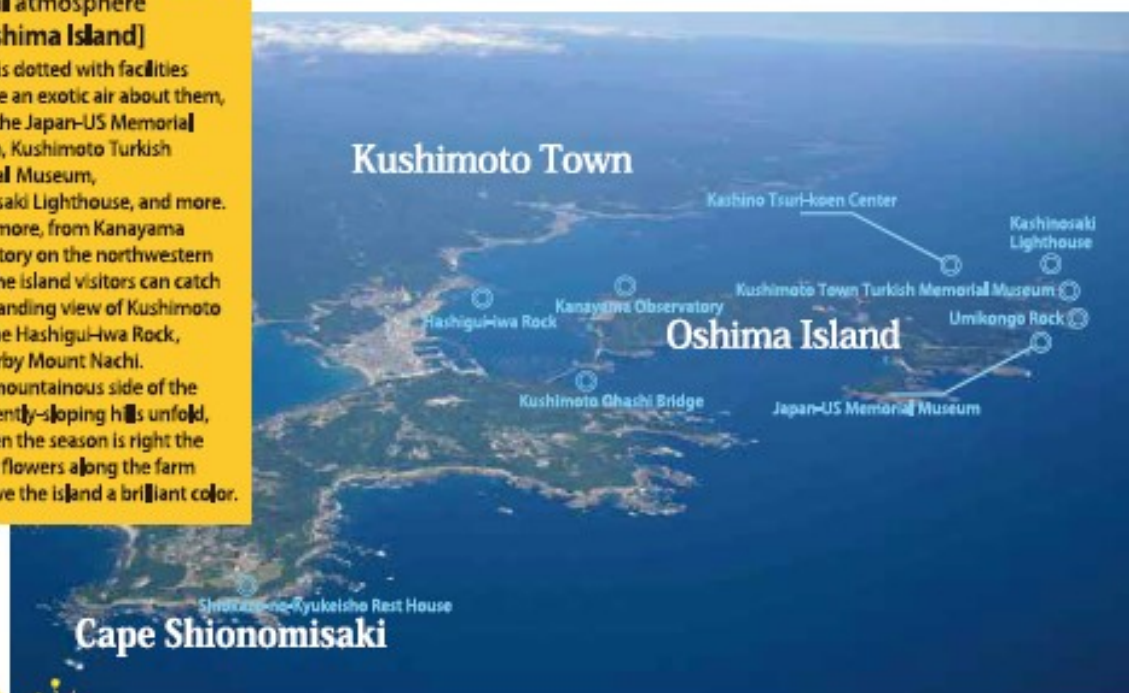
KUSHIMOTO IN JAPAN

[Explanation in English-speaking countries (USA, UK, Australia, Canada, New Zealand)]



An island overflowing with a tropical atmosphere [Kii-Oshima Island]

Oshima is dotted with facilities that have an exotic air about them, such as the Japan-US Memorial Museum, Kushimoto Turkish Memorial Museum, Kashinosaki Lighthouse, and more. What is more, from Kanayama Observatory on the northwestern part of the island visitors can catch a commanding view of Kushimoto Town, the Hashigui-Hwa Rock, and nearby Mount Nachi. On the mountainous side of the island gently-sloping hills unfold, and when the season is right the colorful flowers along the farm roads give the island a brilliant color.

The year is 1791, 62 years before Perry would arrive in Uraga aboard his black ships. Two merchant ships from the United States called the Lady Washington and the Grace arrived at Oshima.

[Umikongo Rock]

Oshima Island is mainly surrounded by precipitous cliffs rising steeply from the sea. One of its fascinating features is the "Umikongo Rock," a natural work of art created by the untamed waves that are both awe-inspiring and mystical. This arrangement of polished rocks and cliffs of diverse sizes is revered as the pinnacle of nature's creation. In January 1983, the Asahi Shimbun recognized it among the "Top 100 natural landscapes worth preserving in 21st-century Japan."

[Japan-U.S. Memorial Museum]

Kushimoto Town has flourished as a strategic location for maritime transportation since ancient times. In 1791, 62 years before Japan opened its doors to the world with the arrival of Commodore Perry's "Black Ships," two merchant vessels, the Lady Washington and the Grace, arrived in Oshima. This is regarded as the first publicly recorded contact between Japan and the U.S. The Japan-U.S. Memorial Museum was established to commemorate this moment, with exhibits of photos, dioramas, and ship models to offer a glimpse into this historical occasion.

In May 2010 a bronze statue of Kemal Atatürk, the founding father of Turkey and its first president, was relocated from the Museum of Maritime Science in Odalba, Tokyo, to Kushimoto Town in Wakayama Prefecture. The statue was erected to lend decoration for an event commemorating the 120-year anniversary of friendly relations between Japan and Turkey.



[The Ertuğrul Warship Tragedy]

While navigating through the Kumano Sea during a typhoon in the dead of night on September 16, 1890, the Ertuğrul ran aground off the coast of Kashinosaki in Oshima, Kushimoto Town, where its hull ruptured and the entire crew was cast out into the raging seas.

This was a terrible tragedy in which 587 sailors under Admiral Ali Osman Pasha lost their precious lives. A surviving crew member who washed up ashore beneath Kashinosaki Lighthouse scaled a 40m cliff by using the light from the lighthouse as a lifeline to seek help.

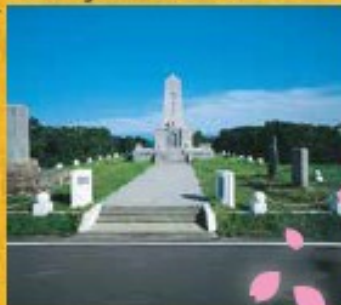
Upon being notified of the wreck, the residents of Oshima rushed out into the raging tempest of the typhoon en-masse, risking their lives to rescue the survivors from the reefs.

They warmed the chilled bodies of the crew members and provided the survivors with food from their own reserves, which had been depleted by the typhoon, and nursed them with great care. As a result, they saved the lives of 69 sailors.

They also respectfully buried the bodies they were able to pull from the water on a hill at Kashino. The devotion displayed by the residents of Oshima island to the survivors has long been passed down through stories, and it is remembered as the start of a history of friendship between Turkey and Japan.

[Kushimoto Town Turkish Memorial Museum]

Items like a model of the Ertuğrul, items that belonged to the deceased, and photos are on display at the Kushimoto Turkish Memorial and Museum, as it offers a view of how things were like back then.

[Kashinosaki Lighthouse]

Kashinosaki Lighthouse, which was erected on the cliffs of Kashino on the eastern tip of Oshima, is the oldest stonework lighthouse in Japan.

This lighthouse, which is still actively used today, was designed by an Englishman.

Daffodils planted by the English engineers that were once permanently stationed within the park grow en-masse here, with lovely flowers carpeting the ground when winter falls and enveloping the surrounding area in a sweet fragrance.



[Kashino Tsuriko Center]

The Kashino Tsuriko Center (Fishing park) is the place to enjoy some carefree fishing on Oshima.

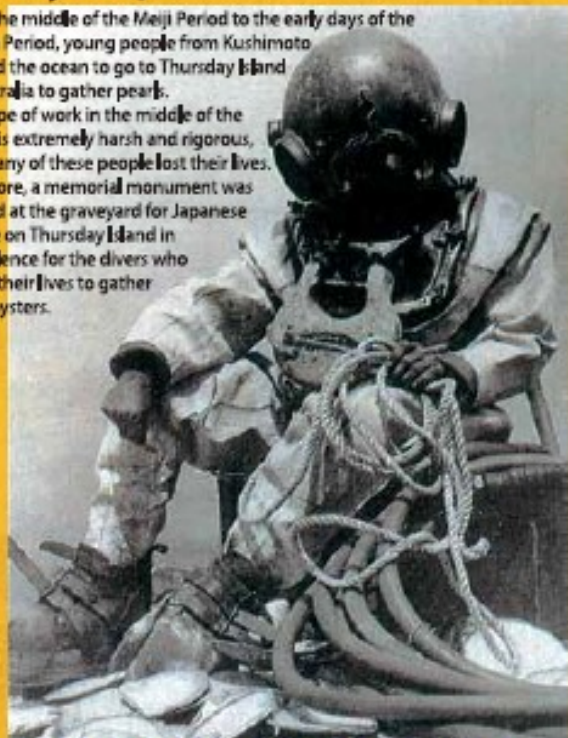
The park is stocked with natural fish like red seabream, striped beakfish, and brassy chub.

It offers rental fishing rods, and visitors can take home the fish they catch here. At the dining hall within the park, they even cook for you the fresh fish you just caught.

[Thursday Island]

From the middle of the Meiji Period to the early days of the Showa Period, young people from Kushimoto crossed the ocean to go to Thursday Island in Australia to gather pearls.

This type of work in the middle of the ocean is extremely harsh and rigorous, and many of these people lost their lives. Therefore, a memorial monument was erected at the graveyard for Japanese people on Thursday Island in condolence for the divers who risked their lives to gather pearl oysters.



[Southernmost Point of Honshu - Shiohaze-no-Kyukeisho Rest House]

This is a rest area for those visiting Shionomisaki, the southernmost point of Honshu in Yoshino-Kumano National Park. Here, you can unwind on the observation terrace while learning about the fascinating land of Shionomisaki and the diverse nature that thrives due to the blessings of the land and the nutrient-rich Kuroshio Current. Additionally, you can discover the history of the people of Kushimoto town, who traveled to Australia in search of the prized white pearl shell.

Look, listen, touch.

Hands-on sightseeing will make your trip to Kushimoto even more spectacular.

The Koza-gawa River boasts magnificent streams and beautiful scenery. It is one of the most outstanding clear streams in Japan, and is so transparent you can practically see clearly down to the riverbed.

It offers runs that canoe enthusiasts would love, and due to its calm currents even beginners can safely enjoy canoeing here. Sea kayaking, where you can float in a carefree manner between the waves of the Pacific Ocean, is also a popular leisure activity. Kayakers can also see the nearby islands of Kuroshima and Taishima, which served as a base for Kumano Suigun Pirates, as they feel the salty sea breeze blowing on them.

Visitors can also experience diving, where they can get a feel for the majesty of the sea in a manner that is safe even for beginners who are diving for the first time. Amidst the transparent ocean waters, divers can encounter more than 100 species of coral and multicolored fishes, thereby experiencing the excitement of a whole new world.

There is a long list of items that visitors can personally experience against the backdrop of Mother Nature fostered by the Kuroshio Current and the warm climate.

One of the charms of Kushimoto Town is the fact that everyone from children to adults can readily enjoy the experience of feeding tuna fish.

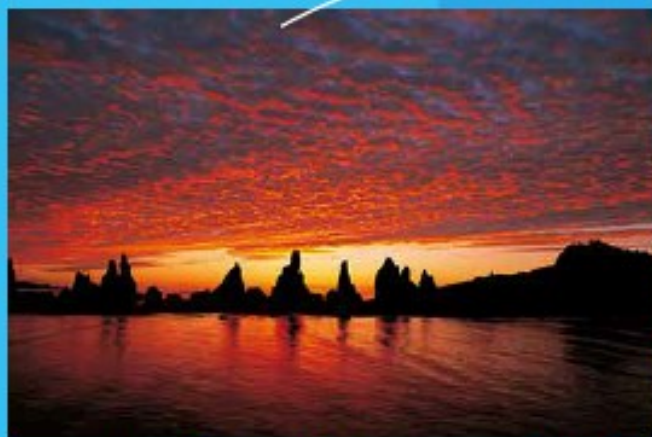


[Muryo-ji Temple]

● Image of a dragon painted on a fusuma door panel at the Oryo Rosetsu Gallery

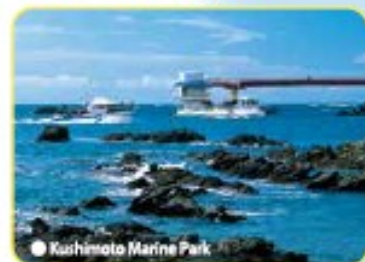


Japan's Natural Treasure [Hashigui-iwa Rock]

The rock formation gets its name from the 850 m stretch of unusually shaped rocks resembling the stakes of a bridge that line the northeastern coast of Kushimoto Town, extending towards Oshima. The sunrise is breathtaking, making this location ideal for capturing stunning photographs.

[Shionomisaki Lighthouse]

Located at the southernmost point of Honshu, the Shionomisaki Lighthouse has been watching offshore ships for over a century. Its resplendent appearance is majestic and beautiful, gleaming in the bright sun and braving wind and rain. Visitors can climb to the top and witness the earth's curvature from afar. Adjacent to the lighthouse, at the tip of the cape, lies a sprawling 10-hectare lawn facing the sea. This expansive watchtower lawn is often utilized for excursions and limited-time campsites.

[Walking the Ohechi Route of the Kumano Kodo]

The Ohechi Trail is the most famous trail of the Kumano Kodo, which is a pilgrimage route for those who aspire to visit the Kumano Sanzan (Three Main Kumano Shrines), and is known for its scenic beauty. It has been tread by numerous writers and artists, who have traveled down this ancient road since time immemorial while enjoying the natural landscapes that interweave the ocean with the mountains.



[Colony of Table Corals]

The vast and crystal-clear sea is home to around 120 species of corals, creating magnificent underwater scenery. The northernmost coral ecosystem in the world thrives here, attracting schools of migratory fish riding the Kuroshio Current. The lively sea is teeming with colorful tropical fish that resemble sparkling gemstones. In November 2005, this internationally important ecosystem was registered under the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands. Kushimoto Town is where nature is at its vibrant best, and people and the environment coexist harmoniously.

[Tuna]

Over the course of 32 years, the Aquaculture Research Institute, Kindai University became the first institute in the world to establish complete aquaculture for the Pacific Bluefin tuna. Thanks in part to this, Kushimoto Town now has a thriving Pacific Bluefin tuna aquaculture industry. In the town, you can enjoy an enormous variety of cuisines such as burgers and uncured ham made using natural, farm-raised tuna.



[Skipjack tuna]

Kushimoto Town is famous for being the birthplace of kenken fishing for skipjack tuna. Kenken fishing refers to a method of fishing in which bait is used to pull in skipjack tuna while the boat is in motion. The skipjack tuna caught here is characterized by the fact that it has been buffeted by the raging seas of the Kuroshio Current, which causes the flesh to firm up nicely. It can be served seared or as sashimi, and both its taste and texture are truly exquisite.

[Local Kushimoto Sweets]

■ Kushimoto is a town with friendly relations with Turkey. One thing that comes to mind when you say Turkey is dondurma, a type of stretchy ice cream. Visitors can savor the authentic taste of Turkey right here in Kushimoto Town. Nothing like an exotic dessert to clear away the fatigue of traveling.

Why not take a short breather?

■ Our predecessors remained devoted to developing a less-sweet red bean paste. Devoted to this are the Usukawa Manju, and Yakan, a sweet bean jelly that has been praised on the internet and television.

For the Tateiwamaki, which is reminiscent of Hashiguriwa Rocks, smooth, home-made bean past that simply melts in your mouth is wrapped in a fluffy home-baked outer layer. They are made with an insistence on using local eggs and domestic wheat flour.

The town has tons of popular sweets, including recommended delicacies, cheese ange, and more.

■ Kushimoto Town is a growing region for kumquats and ponkan, which are delicious eaten as is, and their characteristic sourness that is suited for soft-serve ice cream, juices, and jams makes for some rather refreshing rare delicacies.

[Futons]

The room clerk at ryokans will lay out your futon for you. When you get up in the morning, you may be confused as to whether you should fold them up or just leave them as they are. While it may seem like bad manners to you, there are staff that handle the clean-up and will exchange the bedding for you, so you can just leave it how it was when you got up. If you lightly fold your yukata and place it on top of your futon, it will leave a positive impression in terms of appearances.

Etiquette for Japanese-style Ryokans and Hot Springs

[Yukata]

● In ryokans you can walk around in a yukata and slippers. If there are restaurants or hot springs within the hotel, you may make use of them while wearing a yukata.



● When leaving the ryokan, you cannot leave the ryokan while wearing a yukata and slippers. *This may vary depending on the ryokan, so please confirm with the staff.

[Hot Springs]

● Fresh bathwater poured over oneself. Don't go and soak yourself in a bathtub right away. First, pour hot water over your body to wash away the sweat before soaking in a tub. After that, wash your body and face, then soak yourself in the hot water once more in a leisurely manner.

● Prohibited activities

- × You may not eat or drink in the bathing room.
- × You may not put any sort of bathwater additives in the bath.
- × You may not put a towel in the bathtub.
- × You may not wash laundry in the bathing room.

春 SPRING

End of March
— Cherry blossoms bloom

Third Sunday of May
— Koza River Clean Up Drive

Every year, the best time to see the roughly 1,800 cherry trees, including Yoshino cherry trees, mountain cherry trees, Oshima cherry trees, and double-flowered cherry trees, that were planted at Shionomisaki and Shizaki-no-mori park arrives in early April. Promenades and open plazas have been installed within the park that are absolutely perfect for viewing the cherry blossoms. Why not go for a hike with the family someday when the weather's nice?



夏 SUMMER

July 1 — Opening of the ocean swimming areas
Mid-July — Bishfish Tournament in Kushimoto
July 4th Saturday and Sunday — Kouchi (Mifune) Festival
End of July — Hashigui Ocean Summer Festival

Early in August — Kushimoto Festival
This is an annual festival of the Kouchi Shrine, which is said to convey an image of the triumphant return of the Kumano Suigan Pirates, who traveled to the frontlines of the battle between the Genji and Heike clans and returned victorious. The most magnificent highlights of this festival, which has been designated as a national important intangible folk culture asset, include a parade on the water of a conveyer that consists of Miharu (the boat of the Deity), Takao-bane (theus-eiwat), Kaidenma (wooden boat), boat, Shishimaidama (bar dance) boat with people performing the bar dance on them, as well as a festival eve vigil with the main festival taking place every year on the 4th Sunday of July.

Kushimoto Autumn Festival
This is held starting from the second Saturday and Sunday in October, and during the three-day holiday you can encounter festival and ceremonial performances of the bar dance over the town.
Most of the regional festivals are held around the same time, and performances of the bar dance where attendees can enjoy a Nanki festival.

First Sunday in December — Nenneko Festival

— Henshu's southernmost Fire Festival (burning of the Boronoshiba lawn around the Shionomisaki tower)

— Oshima Minato Festival

This lawn burning is held on the Boronoshiba lawn around the Shionomisaki tower. Every year numerous photographers come to take photos of the fire lit to completely burn away the lawn, which is roughly 100,000m². The goal is to exterminate harmful insects and promote the growth of new grass by burning the withered grass.

[How to Ride the Bus]

At the bus stop, get in the line for the bus heading to your destination and wait for the bus. When the bus arrives, board the bus in order starting with the people at the front of the line.

When you first get on, put the 200 yen fare into the fare box located next to the driver's seat (pay in advance).

Regardless of where you board and get off the bus, the fee is always 200 yen per ride. Take one boarding ticket indicating where you boarded the bus.
